1. Understand your property's specifics

A site survey will show you all zoning setbacks, establish the building envelope, show topography and all utilities.

2. Soil testing

Proper soil testing will determine the type of foundation system you need for your lot. Knowing this ahead of time, ensures your budget is accurate.

3. Be honest about your budget

This allows the design to reflect your specific wants and needs without getting out of control or underwhelming.

4. Design is a team approach

Choosing a design team to work with is all about relationships. Set up an appointment to meet face-to-face to ensure the right personality fit.

5. Single point of responsibility

Single point of responsibility is also important in deciding on a design team. Design teams that cover all facets of the process create efficiencies for you and your general contractor.

6. Visualization tools

Visualization tools are important for a design team to have. 3D tools help you visualize exactly what you are getting prior to construction.

7. Awareness of special requirements

Understand your special requirements with room sizes that work for your needs. Measuring your current spaces helps you to determine what is working and what isn't.

8. Photo examples

Gather pictures of exterior and interior styles you like. This helps the designer get inside your head. Websites like Houzz allow you to gather them in one spot.

9. Patience and honesty

Design is a process, so be prepared to be patient and be honest with what you like and don't like. Both are important to the designer to create the space that works best for you.

10. Time management

To stay on track with a design and build timeline, be ready to make decisions accordingly. Design works with a team approach. Everyone needs to do their part per the established timeline.
